ERASMUS+ Student Mobility 2024/25

- The Mobility Online Application portal is expected to open on 15 January 2024.
 The DEADLINE for Anglistik-places is Tuesday, 20 February 2024!

- In early March, short (online?) interviews will be held with candidates. You will receive your invitation for the interview via email at the beginning of March.
- The academic calendar of our partner universities may differ substantially from Vienna University.

 In the UK and in Ireland the first semester often ends around Christmas, with the second semester starting in (mid-)January, which may cause impractical overlaps with first-semester modules in Vienna.

- A reliable up-to-date list of places will be available on 15 January, when Mobility Online 2024/25 opens.
- Note the terminology: on a British/Irish/North American university website, "course" usually means Studienprogramm, while individual "Lehrveranstaltungen"/"Kurse") are called **modules** or units.
- In the UK and Ireland, modules tend to be bigger, e.g. 7.5, 10 or even 15 ECTS. Often, no catalogue of modules (Vorlesungsverzeichnis) is available; lists of modules can be found on the department website.

University College Dublin (UCD)

- Our main partner is the School of English, Drama and Film.
 The Linguistics Department is smaller, but some modules can also be selected from there. Students interested in *Irish Studies* are welcome to also select courses from that area.
- Most courses are selected from the School of English, Drama and Film / School of Languages, Cultures and Linguistics / School of Irish, Celtic Studies and Folklore. Subject areas include Anglo-Irish, English and American Literature; synchronic linguistics; Gaelic language and culture etc. Film & Drama modules are crowded and usually restrictions apply.
- UCD is suitable for BA, and B.Ed. students, but less for MA ALC, MA ELL and M.Ed. students. This is a)
 because UCD's linguistics department offers only a small range of linguistics courses (mostly
 synchronic/descriptive) and b) the School of English has recently restricted the number of level 3 courses in
 ENG or Creative Writing to ONE per semester. UCD modules carry either 5 or 10 ECTS.

University of Limerick

- The University is situated in the southwest of Ireland, about 4 km outside the city, on both sides of the Shannon river. This agreement started in 2019/20.
- Our partner department is the School of Linguistics and Modern Languages, especially Linguistics with TESOL
 at undergraduate and MA level. Some access to English Literature modules is also possible.
- Since the range of Linguistics courses is fairly limited (focussing on Sociolinguistics and Tesol), Limerick is only suitable for **Bachelor students (BA and B.Ed.)**

Trinity College Dublin

- Top university, situated in the centre of Dublin, founded in 1592, around the same time as Oxford and Cambridge Colleges.
- TCD Undergraduate programmes last four years and have traditional names: Junior Fresher (1st year), Senior Fresher (2nd year), Junior Sophister (3rd year) and Senior Sophister (4th year). The semesters are called Michaelmas (first semester) and Hilary term. Erasmus students will usually select modules from Senior Fresher and Junior Sophister years. Junior and Senior Fresher modules have 5, Junior (and Senior) Sophister 10 ECTS.
- We two agreements with TCD: with the School of English and the School of Linguistics, Speech and Communication Sciences, the latter focussing on Communication Studies, Clinical Speech, and Deaf Studies.
- It is possible to select modules from both schools, but students interested in attending modules of one school only would be given precedence; also, no more than two students can be nominated for the School of English.
- TCD places are suitable for (good!) BA, MA ALC and B.Ed. students.

University College Cork

- Situated in the south-west of Ireland. UCC has a very good reputation, also in the area of Arts.
- This is another new exchange; so far, we don't have any feedback from our own students. The School of English covers a broad range of areas, including Creative Writing as well as Digital Arts and Humanities.
- UCC does not offer linguistics at undergraduate (Erasmus) level.
- Suitable for BA and MA ALC students.

University of Aberdeen

Note that Scottish Universities have a four-year undergraduate programme which ends with a Master degree. At Aberdeen, you will be choosing modules ainly from level 3; level 2 if necessary. Level 4 is closed to exchange students. Aberdeen modules usually carry 15 ECTS per module!

- The module catalogue is small, and modules are big (15 ECTS; at times, 7.5 ECTS modules can be found), covering Scottish, Irish, English and American Literature as well as linguistics. The range of linguistics modules has increased over the last years. Modules should preferably chosen from Level 3; level 2 only if necessary. Level 4 modules are closed for exchange students.
- Film studies is also usually closed to exchange students; one module (especially if a smaller 7.5 ECTS module) from another subject may at times be selected (e.g. Geography, History, Celtic Studies, Music and so on). Occasionally modules have an interdisciplinary topic and can be split up between two SPLs (but this is not often possible).
- Aberdeen is suitable for BA and MA ALC students as well as B.Ed. students (depending on what modules are still open for recognition).

University of Edinburgh

N.B. Scottish Universities have a four-year undergraduate study programme called MA. At Edinburgh, level 3 and level 4 courses are referred to as Honours courses (specialised modules). The module list for visiting students is usually shorter than the actual range of modules offered.

Our cooperation with the University of Edinburgh covers three areas. We have an agreement with English Literature (two places maximum) and we have a bigger cross-faculty agreement with German Studies, through which we also have access to Linguistics (another two to three places). (Vienna is extremely popular with German Studies students).

Access to the two areas can be mixed, that is **B.Ed.** and **BA** students wishing to take a combination of literature and linguistics courses can apply, but **MA** (**ELL or ALC**) students will have priority if we have suitable candidates.

- Suitable candidates would be MA ALC, MA ELL, BA students. B.Ed. and M.Ed. students depending on second subject / modules which can be recognized (Edinburgh courses always have 10 ECTS, so only three courses can be selected).
- Access to German Department possible
- Grades from Vienna are checked carefully and only good students (B = 2) will be accepted on third-level courses (the range of first-and second year courses is very limited and comprises just a few very big survey courses).
- Edinburgh demands an official language test (IELTS, TOEFL, or Cambridge)

The University of Manchester

- Manchester offers both excellent Linguistics and Literature
- Modules have 10 ECTS, only three modules can be selected per semester.
 The university prefers students taking a mixture of courses, not the full 30 ECTS from just one Department.
 10 ECTS (one module) could also be chosen from a School outside Humanities.
- Suitable for **BA** students, advanced **B.Ed.** students with free electives; **M.Ed.** students in their first semester.
- Taking and submitting an official language test after your nomination to Manchester is highly recommended as it will increase your chances to be admitted to higher level (English) language and literature modules.

WARWICK University

- Another new agreement. Warwick (situated outside the city of Coventry, in the western Midlands) has an
 excellent literature department, and has recently also set up a big linguistics department (Applied Linguistics
 and Modern Languages). At the moment our exchange agreement is with literature and it is not clear
 whether access to linguistics courses would also be possible.
- Warwick modules tend to be a bit smaller than in other universities (6-7 ECTS).
- In the coming year 2024/25 we would like to offer the place to an **BA** student with a strong interest in literature.
- Submitting an official language test after nomination to Warwick is highly recommended (although Warwick will also accept a "gut" in English in the Austrian *Maturazeugnis*).

University of York

- It seems that the Department structure at the University of York has somewhat changed in the last years since Modern Languages does no longer appear in the name of the Department, which now focusses very much on Linguistics.
 - Limited access to literature modules is possible.
- Best suitable for **BA** students with an interest in linguistics, **B.Ed.** students who still have electives and some other linguistics modules open. **MA ELL** and **M.Ed.** students might also consider the place.
- York demands an IELTS (academic) with results from 6.5 onwards (to be taken once nominated).

This department still offers "Modern Languages", i.e. foreign languages, but these have very much shifted into the background. The focus now is on theoretical and applied linguistics. TESOL modules are also offered, but they are usually booked out by York students and are also too general in content to be recognised for *Fachdidaktik* in Vienna. If accessible, they could serve as B.Ed. electives.

UK GOLDSMITHS COLLEGE, University of London

- This college is situated in south-east London.
- Our partner institution is the *Department of English and Creative Writing* (Faculty of Arts and Humanities)
- Linguistics is included in the curriculum, although the main focus is on literature and media studies
- Modules usually have 7.5 ECTS, some may also have 15 ECTS.
- Goldsmiths is best suited for **BA** students interested in literature and media studies, **MA ALC** students, but also for **B.Ed.** students who still have electives and some literature and cultural Studies modules open.

University of Southampton

- Our partner is the *School of Modern Languages*, where French, German, Spanish is taught; the school also includes Linguistics, especially Applied Linguistics and English Language Teaching
- In 2023/24, access to modules was extremely limited. At the time of writing (11 Jan 2024) only **one place to a BA or B.Ed. student** (with German Studies?) will be offered and this student still needs to have their extensions / electives ECTS open for recognition in case module access is once again limited.

 M. Wittmann will try to get reliable information about module access before the end of the application deadline. In 2021/22 and years before we did not have any such problems.

University of Exeter

Not clear whether this university will be offered in 2024/25

Exeter, an excellent university, has a very good Department of English, which is a pure literature / cultural studies department; no linguistics is taught at Exeter.

Unfortunately, we never had an Erasmus agreement with the English Department. British universities tend to change their internal structure relatively often; so our students had access to English courses whenever the English Department and and Modern Languages were united in the same Faculty or School, and we were locked out whenever the School of English was a separate unit.

In 2019, we were informed about an interesting new option in the context of the opening of a second location - Penryn Campus - in Cornwall (the following is an extract from the email we received):

However, we now have an exciting new possibility where incoming Erasmus exchange students are able to request English and History modules at our Penryn Campus in Cornwall. This allows students of English Language, Literature and Culture, as well as History, to take modules that will reflect and enhance their home degree programme. Our Penryn Campus provides students with a University of Exeter education in a stunning location near to the waterside town of Falmouth and the beautiful beaches of southern Cornwall. The campus is a smaller, more close-knit environment of 5000 students and offers a vibrant diverse mix of students from the Arts and Humanities alongside students of the Sciences, Politics and Business among other subjects. What's more, the small friendly campus means that students get a strong feeling of community where everyone gets to know each other quickly. All of this will be particularly appealing to your Erasmus exchange students of English and History, as not only will they have more chance to study the modules they enjoy, but they will also be able to integrate into the friendly campus life whilst discovering a uniquely beautiful area of the UK. Furthermore, we will also be able to guarantee accommodation for students studying at Penryn campus, even for a single semester

B.Ed. students with German Studies

 Quick integration / immersion is almost guaranteed for both campuses, Exeter and Penryn campus. This has always been a great bonus of Exeter, apart from its excellent teaching.
